'A tale of two cities: cases of Copenhagen and Glasgow'

Abstract

In urban regeneration, Copenhagen and Glasgow have shared experiences and learned from each other for many years. Despite the differences between them – one at a European crossroads, one looking westwards from the edge of Europe; one with an ancient trading history, one with an industrial history – there are many similarities because of their relationship to the sea. It has been the cause of both growth and decline – and potentially the basis of future renewal.

Both cities have particular areas that face the challenge of decline and therefore social, economic and environmental exclusion. Kongens Enghave in Copenhagen and Govan in Glasgow are both 'islands', cut off both geographically and culturally from the rest of the city. The presentation will look at how these cities are approaching Social Inclusion, using Kongens Enghave and Govan as examples.
